

Program Description 2



1. Program Philosophy

To educate students to become intellectual and successful graduates who achieve the program's expected learning outcomes, this program follows the principles of outcome-based education in which all learning outcomes can be achieved through learning-centered approach and constructivism theory. The graduates' characteristics will also align with the National TQF Graduates Competencies and MU Graduate Attributes.

2. Program–level Learning Outcomes

At the end of the program, successful students will be able to

- 1) Communicate in the high level at HSK level 6 or equivalent of Chinese with target audience correctly, appropriately and ethically in each situation;
- 2) Evaluate knowledge and information in terms of Chinese language and culture critically and ethically;
- 3) Express academic opinions about Chinese or China in English to target audience clearly and purposefully;
- 4) Create and construct an argument about current Chinese issues effectively;
- 5) Complete a term paper in Chinese on a topic approval of the Program Committee of Chinese systematically and ethically;

 3) A medical certificate verificate verificates approval of the Program Committee of Chinese systematically and ethically;
- 6) Work individually with responsibilities and ethics consistently; and
- 7) Cooperate with others to achieve team goals based on situations and roles effectively.

3. Study Sites

Plan A: All academic study will take place at the Faculty of Liberal Arts, Mahidol University.

Plan B1 and B2: The study will take place at the Faculty of Liberal Arts, Mahidol University during the first and the fourth year of the program, while the study in the second and the third year will take place at the School of Humanities, Shanghai Jiao University, PRC.

4. Requirements for Plan B1 and B2 Students at Shanghai Jiao Tong University

BA in Chinese students who would like to study at Shanghai Jiao Tong University to develop their learning experience in the field of Chinese language and culture or business Chinese in a multicultural-international environment during the second year to the third year of study have to meet the following criteria:

- 1) Successful completion of the first year of the BA in Chinese program at the Faculty of Liberal Arts, Mahidol University
- 2) An overall HSK level 5 score of 180 or the approval of the Program Committee
- 3) A medical certificate verifying no mental health problem from hospital or institute that related to mental health assessment

5. Educational Management System and Academic Calendar

1. Educational Management System

1.1 System

Semester system: Each academic year is divided into two regular semesters--Semester 1 and Semester 2. Each Semester consists of at least 15 weeks.

1.2 Summer Sessions

According to Mahidol University's Regulations on Diploma and Undergraduate Studies of Year B.E. 2552-2563 and the Faculty of Liberal Arts's Announcement of Year B.E 2553, Summer session is not a compulsory session. For the Faculty of Liberal Arts, a summer session of any courses can be offered when at least 15 students who failed the course during the regular semester enroll on the summer session.

2. Academic Calendar

In regular management, the offered courses are scheduled during normal working hours (08:30 a.m. - 04:30 p.m.) on weekday (Monday – Friday). However, teaching and learning outside of normal working hour are possible with appropriate management.

Semester: 1st Semester: August - December 2nd Semester: January - May

The academic calendar is subject to change according to the decision of the University Council.

Credit Requirements

For Plan A: No fewer than 146 credits of courses must be taken while studying at Mahidol University.

For Plan B1: No fewer than 88 credits of courses must be taken while studying at Mahidol University, and no fewer than 88 credits of courses taken while studying at Shanghai Jiao Tong University (equivalent to Mahidol University's credit)

For Plan B2: No fewer than 87credits of courses must be taken while studying at Mahidol University, and no fewer than 92 credits of courses taken while studying at Shanghai Jiao Tong University (equivalent to Mahidol University's credit)

Note: 1 credit at Shanghai Jiao Tong University is equal to the study period of 1 hour per week for 16 consecutive weeks.

New students register for classes during the orientation week--the week before the semester starts. Returned students register approximately 1-2 weeks before the start of each semester. The registration dates can be found on the Academic Calendar, which is available at the Office of Academic Affairs or on the Faculty of Liberal Arts website.

2. Course Changes (add/drop) and Withdrawal Period

Students can request to add, drop, and withdraw from courses provided the instructors approves and the request is approved by the Dean or a person appointed by the Dean. An approval is given according to the following criteria;

2. Dropping a course: Dropped courses will not appear in the transcript for the grade report and not be counted as formerly enrolled if the dropping request is submitted within the second week of a regular semester, counting from the semester's start date. As for the courses that are not offered at the start of the semester, request for dropping can be submitted within the first week from the

Course withdrawal: For regular semester, request for course withdrawal can be submitted after the second week from the start of the semester until the last two week before the start of the final examination period. For the summer session and any courses that do not start at the beginning of the semester, request for course withdrawal can be done after the first week of the course until the week before the start of the final examination period. Withdrawn courses appear in the transcript and the grade report and are counted as registered courses. Reasons for approval and disapproval of the request shall be clarified by the Dean or an appointed person.





Students must complete the following requirements:

1. Plan A

- Students must follow Mahidol University's Regulations on Diploma and Undergraduate Studies, B.E.2552 (2009) - 2563 (2020) and the Announcement of the Faculty of Liberal Arts, Mahidol University on Evaluation Criteria Undergraduate Study, B.E, 2563 (2020)
- Total time of study should not exceed 8 academic years
- Students have to complete their credits, consisting of general education courses, specific courses and free elective courses, as stated in the curriculum.

- Students must have a minimum 2.00 CUM-GPA.
- Students must pass one of the criteria for the English competency according to Mahidol University's regulations: for more Click information

- Students must demonstrate proper conduct in compliance with the Bachelor of Arts degree.

Student Affairs



Student Affairs at the Faculty of Liberal Arts is a division that supports the missions of the university and faculty and organizes activities to enhance student skills and experiences.

Student Activities at Mahidol University

Mahidol University has a policy of supporting and developing student activities to enhance student's moral and ethical experiences, support their physical wellbeing, and develop their character thus allowing them to grow as individuals, lead happy lives, and be of service to society. Activity Transcript (AT)

The Activity Transcript database system records and compiles information pertaining to a student's participation in extracurricular activities during the student's years of study at Mahidol University. Furthermore, once a student has attended the total number of activities as required by the university, the student will receive an activity transcript certifying attainment of the requirement. A student can check his or her activity participation history via www.activity.mahidol.ac.th.

The Faculty of Liberal Arts has carried out the policy of the university by supporting and creating activities that align with all five areas of student development since 2019. Students can search for activities through the Activity Transcript system (www.activity.mahidol.ac.th) and can accumulate the required 100 hours as per the university announcement. Upon completion of university studies, students will receive a certificate with details of their activity participation results which can be used when, for instance, applying for a job, scholarship, or exchange either inside or outside the country. Each student will also gain experience outside the classroom that is necessary and beneficial for the future.

Requirements for Passing and Receiving the Activity Transcript

- 1. Required activities must be no fewer than two activities totaling six hours, the conditions of which are as follows:
 - university, faculty or college, equaling one activity of three hours
 - 1.2. A Wai Kru ceremony held by the university, faculty or college, equaling one activity of three hours
- 2. Elective activities must account for no fewer than 94 hours, with the following conditions:
 - ten hours
 - 2.2. Mahidol HIDEF activities in three areas (no fewer than ten hours in each area)
 - 2.3. Activities boosting other 21st-Century Skills that are not required

Remarks: Students must pass the requirements set by the university to obtain the activity transcript. Toward the end of his or her university studies, the student must check to make sure he has passed all the university requirements. If the student meets the requirements, he may submit a request or petition to the university to issue an activity transcript. Honors



A student who has studied in an undergraduate program in the university and acquired at least 120 credits including transferred credits is eligible to receive a degree with honors. However, a grade of at least B (or its equivalent) is required for transferred courses and will not be included in the cumulative GPA (CUM-GPA) calculation. In order to receive Class 1 honors, the student must have a CUM-GPA of 3.50 or higher, while a Class 2 honors student must have a CUM-GPA of 3.25 or higher. Moreover, the student must also

- 1. Have not used more time than that indicated in the curriculum.
 - 2. Be eligible to receive a degree by
 - 2.1 Having passed all required courses and fulfilled other criteria indicated in the curriculum.
 - 2.2 Having a CUM-GPA of at least 2.00
 - 2.3 Having good behavior suitable for the prestige of the degree.
- 3. Have never been re-graded or re-registered in courses, re-taken an exam, or re-done a report or project for any course in the curriculum or for transferred courses.
- 4. Have total transferred credits of not more than one-quarter of the total number of credits in the curriculum.



The Faculty of Liberal Arts students can subscribe for membership and renew their membership personally at the Faculty of Liberal Arts Library on the 2nd floor of Sirividhya Building at the Faculty of Liberal Arts, Mahidol University or online at https:// forms.gle/XTbjmbZvsviS7OyWA. Each student's membership will last for 1 academic semester and they will need to renew the membership every semester. To subscribe or renew membership, students must present their student ID card or "We Mahidol" application.









1.3 Check Out Policy

Students can check out a maximum of ten books for ten days. Each borrowed book can be renewed twice to extend the loan period provided there if no other patron requesting it. To renew the loan period, students are asked to bring the books and library member card to the library or renew the books themselves online at www.li.mahidol.ac.th.

1.4 Overdue Fines

Students must return books or extend their loan period (as long as no one else has reserved the books) within the due date. If they miss the outside the Salaya Campus and receive them within due date, the library will charge a fine of five baht per book per day for general books and five to 30 baht per book per day for thesis papers or reserved Contact details: 1 https://www.facebook.com/Libbooks. The student will also not be allowed to <u>eralArts.Library</u> borrow any books if the amount owed exceeds 100 baht. Moreover, failure to pay library fees will affect a student's request to graduate.

1.5 Loss of Materials

If a student loses or damages a library book, the student must inform the service counter, return the item immediately, and purchase a new book to compensate the library as well as pay a processing fee of 200 baht or the fine to repair a damaged book.

1.6 Book Delivery Service

The Mahidol Library Book Delivery is a service that helps students save time and access materials more conveniently. All library members can borrow books from other faculty libraries three days. Students should contact the library staff for the service.


4. Study Room
